RESOLUTIONS SUBMITTED UNDER ARTICLE X, SECTION 2 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE NAACP 2004

Article X. Section 2. (Powers and Functions of the Convention)

The Annual Convention of the Association shall have the power to establish policies and programs of action for the ensuing year. All actions of the Convention on questions of policy and programs which are not contrary to this Constitution shall be binding on the Board of Directors, Officers, branches, youth councils, young adult councils, college and high school chapters and other subordinate units of the Association, except as hereinafter provided. No proposal for change of policy or program of action shall be in order unless it shall have been favorably voted upon at a regular legislative meeting of a branch, youth council, young adult council, college or high school chapter, state area, or regional conference in good standing, or has been submitted by the President/CEO. The proposals for policy or program change must be certified by the President and Secretary of the respective NAACP Unit and received by the President/CEO in the National Office by May 1st annually, prior to the Annual Convention. The Convention shall act on suggested program or policy changes during the Legislative Session of the Convention.
